

Community Meetings

- Our February community meeting included elections for three CNA board seats (won by Jimena Bermejo, Tonia Hicks, Cathie Zusy), History Cambridge introducing their "Year of Cambridgeport", the Charter Review Committee updating us on its work, and a discussion about preserving the "Crosswinds" mural on the Middle East building.
- In February, we also held two community gatherings in response to the fatal police shooting of Sayed Faisal. These were informal listening sessions and connection spaces. One gathering was in-person and the other was virtual.
- Our March community meeting focused on how to turn your house into affordable
 housing, featuring Just-A-Start and a local couple who has bequeathed their home. We
 also met Greatland Realty Partners and learned about their plans for the corner of Erie
 and Sidney.
- Our May community meeting was the first major public meeting about Cambridge's
 Universal Preschool Program, and included an explanation of the program and a
 detailed Q&A. We also heard updates on programming at Magazine Beach by Mass
 Audubon.
- Our September community meeting featured staff from Cambridge's Community Development Department. The focus was their Central Square Lots Study, and neighbors provided feedback and asked questions.
- Our October community meeting was our biannual Candidate Night, where we heard introductions from almost all candidates for City Council and all candidates for School Committee.
- Our <u>December</u> community meeting included two speakers. The first was Manuel Fernandez, Chief Equity Officer from the Cambridge Public Schools, detailing the initiatives of the office of Equity, Inclusion, and Belonging. The second was Sgt. Christopher Ponte presenting on common scams and how to avoid them.

Additional Community Events

April

We hosted our annual Community Clean Up, starting in Dana Park. We again partnered with Cambridge City Growers and included a seedling swap.



May

We hosted another textile and book drive, collecting 3,185 pounds of textiles and earning more than \$400 for future CNA events. We also donated a truck full of books to More Than Words.

June

We held a bike meetup and showcase, including information sharing on how to bike in the city with kids and plenty of fun.

We held our fourth drive, again for textiles and books. We collected 2,380 pounds of textiles for Helpsy and with an extra donation from Helpsy earned S476 for the CNA. More Than Words also took another truckload of books.

Year of the Block Party




Our major initiative in 2023 was "The Year of the Block Party", in parallel with the City of Cambridge's efforts to promote block parties. We supported these community-building efforts through:

- \$200 grants (separate from/in addition to the City's grants) for each of 7 Cambridgeport block parties
- A resource website and crowdsourced checklist
- Volunteer support, with both getting started and executing events
- Discounts from local businesses and a lending library of supplies
- Advertising on our listserv and social media
- Connections with other local partners and block party activities

- The Diversity Equity and Inclusion Committee completed its
 third year of monthly meetings, led by Board Member Valerie
 A. Bonds and former Board Member Brian Aull. Our DEI core
 group and participants provide Cambridgeport with the
 opportunity to discuss issues centered on working against
 racism in our community, creating an understanding through
 shared readings and encouraging a joint effort towards
 equitable outcomes for all. The DEI Committee hosts
 informational meetings and works toward bringing together
 members of our community to address inequities and amplify
 marginalized voices in Cambridge and beyond.
- We served our final year as fiscal sponsor for Black History in Action for Cambridgeport, a nonprofit working for community-based reparations and racial healing at St. Augustine's Church by creating an inclusive Black-led neighborhood space for arts, documentation, organizing, and joy. They no longer need fiscal sponsorship and they will continue to lead on the final stages of restoring St. Augustine's Church.
- In October, our board president joined a team of <u>HRI</u> staff and residents at the 2023 NeighborWorks America Community Leadership Institute. Participants learned about comprehensive approaches to community development and strategies for resident outreach and leadership development. The CNA and HRI will work together on a civic engagement leadership development program, to be announced in 2024.
